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Literary program

The 2011 Castlemaine State Festival's literary program, curated by award-winning author **Cate Kennedy**, brings together the traditional storytelling voices within the community of Castlemaine and its living histories, with contemporary writers and historians telling their stories.

Living Histories comprises 7 different events that take you into the heart of Castlemaine. The offerings in the first days of the festival include:

historian and storyteller **Brian McCormick** at historic Tute's Cottage inviting you into the fascinating behind-the-scenes world of the 'Two Up School'; a tour of Castlemaine through the eyes of Samuel Thomas Gill – the most notable artist who visited Castlemaine during the 1850s goldrush – with guide **Geoff Hocking**; acclaimed historian **Robyn Annear's** real-life accounts of the stories behind two of Castlemaine's best-known landmarks: the *Castlemaine Library* with its remarkable secret roots in spiritualism in the Mechanic's Institute, and *Keep the Market Building*, an eye-opening historical account of this beautiful Castlemaine icon and how it was only just saved from being replaced by a cream brick office block.

The Living Histories series continues with two performances of **Phoenix Vixen Crinoline**, part installation and part performance, written by **Kathrin Ward**, an imagined account of an uncommon marriage played out in the goldfields of 1850s Victoria. Then the renowned **Thompsons Foundry Band**, which has outlived the Foundry itself and has recently celebrated its 125th birthday – invites you to join band members to hear their artistry and their long history.

Finally, festival-goers can immerse themselves in *Living Stories of the Victorian Goldfields*, a richly entertaining and informative series of audio tours of the history and landscape around Castlemaine. Pick up an ipod and wander around Castlemaine listening to well-known storyteller and musician *Jan 'Yarn' Wositzky* combine his talents with those of thirty-five local actors, musicians and historians to bring these vibrant stories alive.

Continuing in the storytelling vein, *It Happened to Me* (2-8 April) is a series of **four nights of mesmerising stories told live on stage** by both well known artists and familiar locals living in the here and now. You'll hear real, unexpected, poignant, dramatic and funny accounts from a stellar range of guests including beloved singer songwriter **Shane Howard**, actress **Helen Morse**, perceptive playwright **Hannie Rayson**, Indigenous historian and author **Tony Birch**, novelist and raconteur **Shane Maloney**, columnist **Mark Dapin**, Victorian Opera Music Director **Richard Gill** and radio journalist **Elly Varenti**, **among other national and international Festival artists and guests**. Themes include: *Stories from Backstage*; *How I Got Here*; A Sense of Home and You Wouldn't Believe It, as this unique and unrepeatable festival event ranges across four diverse, entertaining nights.

Another intriguing session of insightful conversation and storytelling will take place throughout the day on 9 April, when Cate Kennedy invites four fellow writers to join her "on the couch" in conversation at the Theatre Royal. In *The Greatest Story Never Told*, authors will describe a story they would love to write, but never have — and their reasons. Guests include Carmel Bird, Shane Maloney, Mark Dapin and Jarad Henry.

The poetry program takes place in an intimate setting on the 2-3 April, deep inside the heart of Carman's Tunnel in Maldon, a space that was made to mine gold. Poetry readings will take place with Australian poets, Bronwyn Lea, Sarah Day, Les Wicks as well as Andy Jackson and Rachael Wenona Guy's poetry and puppet performance. This very special and intimate series of poetry readings will include works concerned with environment, relationships, family and the epiphanies that have changed the course of a life.

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
