Main stage Performances

1. The Children's Party

The young cast of The Children's Party are creating Australia's first child-led political party, with the help of their young audiences. Asking what it means to include the voices of 6-12 year olds in our political conversation, *The Children's Party* let's arts and politics collide to explore what role young people want to play in shaping our world. Suitable for F-8. Civics and Citizenship/Critical and Creative Thinking/Personal and Social Capability

2. My Urrwai

My Urrwai roughly translates as my 'spirit' or 'style'. This one-woman performance explores artist Ghenoa Gela's life, family and cultural identity as a Torres Strait Islander woman, growing up in Rockhampton in the '90s. Incorporating dance, spoken word and humour. Gela won a 2017 Deadly Funny Award at the Melbourne International Comedy Festival. Suitable for years 3-12. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Histories and Cultures/Intercultural Understanding

3. Picasso and His Dog

Inspired by the true story of Pablo Picasso and his sausage dog, Lump, this delightful show celebrates the animals with whom we share our lives while exploring what it is to be creative and to create. This work is an inventive mix of live art-making on-stage, puppetry and magic realism. Suitable for years F-6. Visual Art Making and Responding/Intercultural Understanding/Critical and Creative Thinking

4. Body Concert

The work of the South Korean Ambiguous Dance Company, this contemporary dance has been metamorphosing since 2010. The emphasis is on pure emotion and energy, with a soundtrack from Mozart to Daft Punk. An exciting addition to 'Hallyu', the wave of Korean culture that has spread across the globe. Suitable for F-12. Asia and Australian Engagement with Asia/Intercultural Understanding/Dance

Workshops for years 3-6 (capacity 2 classes)

1. Eric Avery (Music)

Eric Avery, Indigenous composer, violinist and dancer, performs ancient chants alongside his own compositions. This workshop introduces students to the idea of combining different cultural traditions. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Histories and Cultures/Intercultural Understanding

2. Michael Graeve (Vis Art)

Castlemaine based artist Michael Graeve leads a workshop exploring processes of translation between different materials and senses. Students explore noise, sound, colour, pattern, abstract art, score and composition. Visual Art Making and Responding/Media Arts/Critical and Creative Thinking/Literacy and Numeracy

3. Abdi Karya (Performance)

This Indonesian performance artist explores with students the cultural significance of the sarong, using it to portray shapes, styles, feelings and memories. Asia and Australian Engagement with Asia/Intercultural Understanding

4. Kylie Stillman (Vis Art)

Eucalypt Commission winning artist guides students to use recycled materials to make a delightful book sculpture celebrating the beauty of this iconic Australian tree. Sustainability/Vis Art Making and Responding

5. Jazoo Yang (Vis Art)

Make large-scale tape drawings with Korean artist Jazoo Yang. Created on the exterior of the Ray Bradfield Room, these fun, colourful images will become part of the Festival landscape for the final weekend. Asia and Australian Engagement with Asia/Intercultural Understanding

6. Trace Balla (Dialogues/Cartooning)

Local author and illustrator Trace Balla will provide a sneak preview of her new graphic novella in progress. Students will learn cartooning techniques, and create their own cartoon. Visual

Communication/Literature and Literacy.

7. Frederico Albanese (Music)

Italian pianist Frederico Albanese offers a workshop featuring his unique approach to composition, combining contemporary classical music, electronica and psychedelia. Albanese's work is minimalist and cinematic.

Composition/Performance/Intercultural Understanding

8. Dead Letter Club (Dialogues/Lit)

Melanie Knight's workshop explores the ancient art of letter writing. Literacy/Creative Writing

9. Sisters Akousmatica (Vis Art/Broadcasting)

Transmit yourself! Students will make their own radio receivers, and work collaboratively to create a radio show and tune in to their universe. Science and Technology/Personal and Social Capability/Critical and Creative Thinking

10. Hayley Millar Baker (Vis Art)

Gundjitmara woman Hayley Millar Baker gives students a window into her exploration of photography using collage techniques. She reflects on the strength and resilience of Aboriginal Australia, reimagines what could have been, and reveals the complexities of Aboriginality now.

11. Hayley West (Vis Art)

This workshop explores cultural practices of memorial. The artist gently tackles experiences of personal bereavement, combined with ideas of devotion, memory and absence. Visual Art Making and Responding/Personal and Social Capability

12. Wide Open Road (Vis Art)

Local artists Susie Elliott and Helen Mathwin have worked collaboratively for seven years. For their workshop 'Yes, and...' they facilitate an exploration of the collaborative process, to create a large-scale artwork, constructed through story-telling. Smaller Scale Performances (capacity 2 classes)

1. Dance to the Anticlinal Fold (Poetry Walk)

The adventure starts at the Anticlinal Fold, a locally celebrated rock formation in Castlemaine. Participants will be led by poet-guide Adam Ford on a walk around the local area, along the way they will be told stories from the Castlemaine region, ranging from the present day to pre-history. Featuring historian Robyn Annear, geologist Clive Williams and Indigenous Elder Uncle Rick Nelson. Suitable for years 3-12 (Priority for Primary Students)

Creative Writing/History/Science/ Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Histories and Cultures/Intercultural Understanding

2. Food Concert

If we could store and cook intangible things such as love, what ingredients would you use? A feast is expected – but will you eat what you have not control over making? Sensory experiences, social relations and collective actions are central in this participatory work. Chun-Liang Liu is an interdisciplinary artist based in Taiwan. Suitable for years 3-12 (Priority for Primary Students). Asia and Australian Engagement with Asia/Intercultural Understanding/Personal and Social Capability
